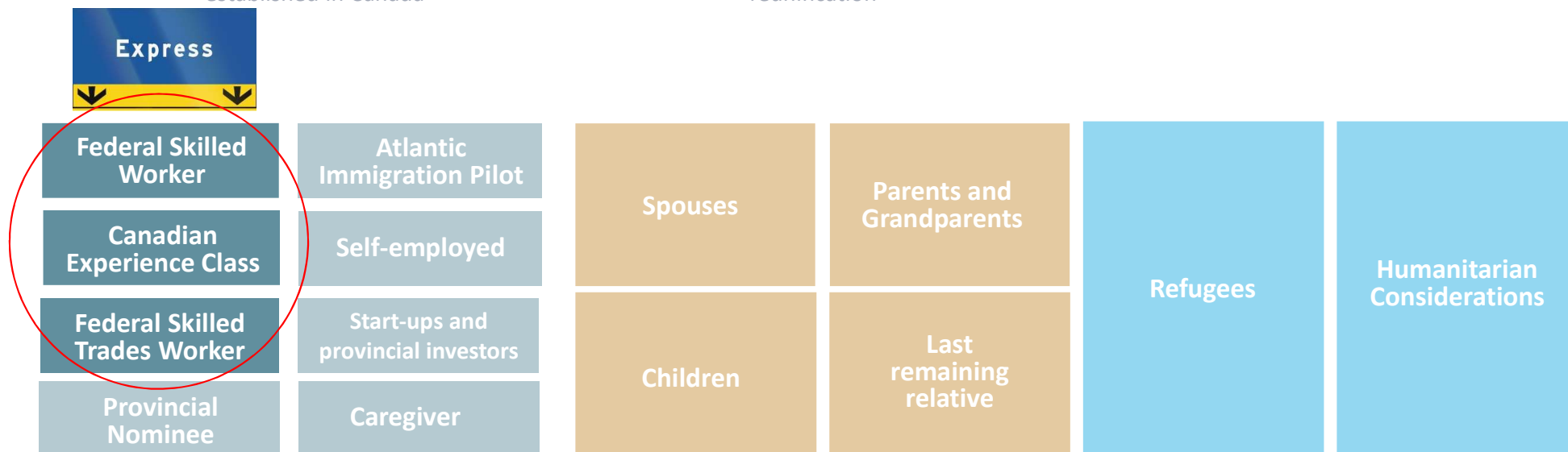

Economic Classes under Express Entry

Federal Skilled Worker

Applicants eligible under one of these categories may create an Express Entry on-line profile (known as an “expression of interest”).

Federal Skilled Trades Worker

If meet minimum criteria, admitted to Express Entry pool. Profile valid for 1 year.

Canadian Experience Class

Ranked according to **Comprehensive Ranking System (CRS)** points among other candidates in pool. Periodic draws where highest ranking candidates are invited to apply for **Permanent Residence**

2-STEP PROCESS

1

Determining and proving eligibility for one of the categories – minimum requirements to be considered. Admitted to pool.

2

Scoring sufficient points through CRS to receive an invitation to apply – ranking competitively among other applicants in the pool of others who met minimum req.

2. Provide ECA
3. Language minimum CLB 7 e.g. IELTS
4. Funds available – minimum \$ amount unless job offer
5. Prove economic ability by achieving min score of 67/100 in six selection factors

Canadian Experience Class

1. One year paid fulltime skilled work experience (main duties of NOC) in Canada in last 3 years (not self-employed, not obtained during fulltime school)
2. Minimum language ability CLB 7 for NOC A or O, CLB 5 for NOCB

Federal Trades Worker

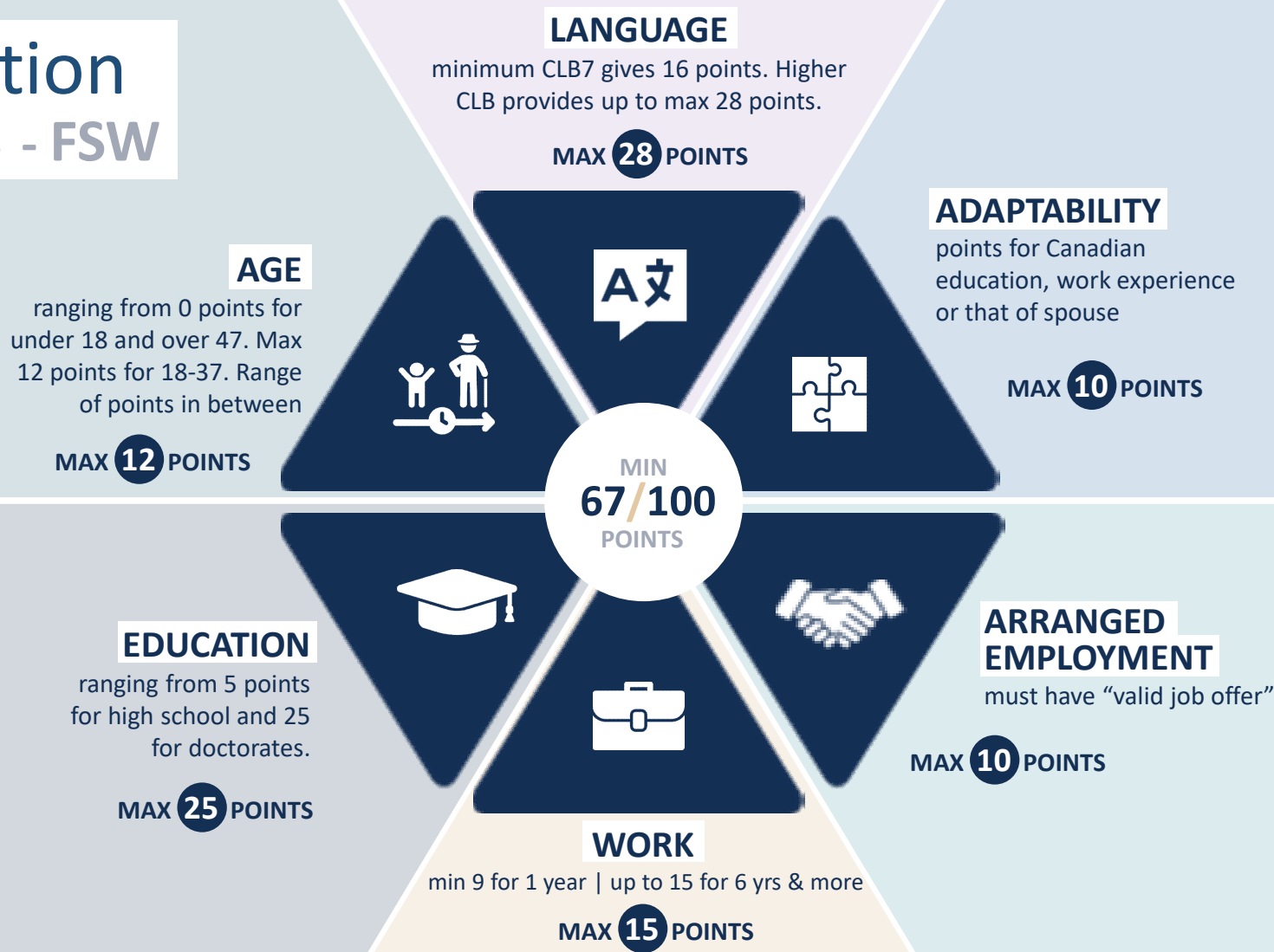

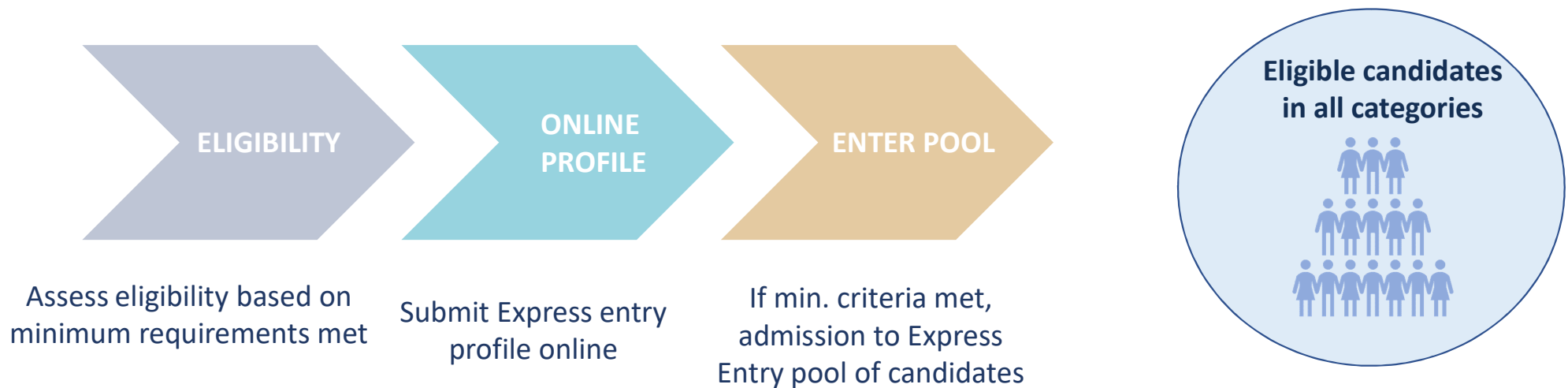

Summary of Express Entry



Assess eligibility based on minimum requirements met

Submit Express entry profile online

If min. criteria met, admission to Express Entry pool of candidates

CRS score assigned automatically based on profile



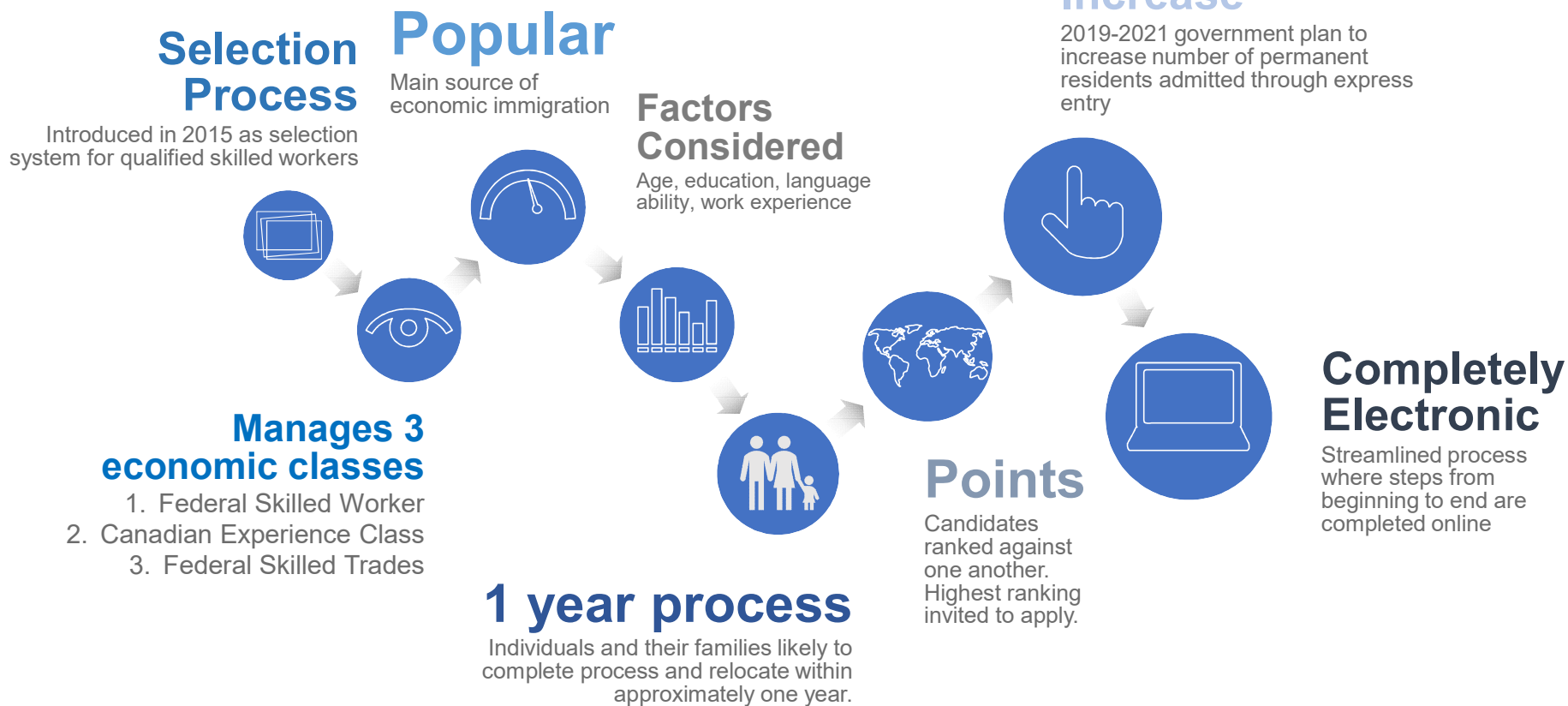
Electronically submit application for permanent residence, processing 6 mos to 1 year

Approx. every 2 weeks, highest ranking candidates drawn from pool, invited to apply for permanent residence

Monitor pool and update profile as new information available e.g. new IELTS score, further work experience

Candidates ranked among others in Express Entry pool

Summary of Express Entry



How to improve CRS Scores



STUDY

Canadian education and academic experience is highly rewarded. A Canadian educational credential can open up a lot of doors.

WORK IN OWN COUNTRY

Working abroad or home country might bring total years of work experience up to maximize CRS scores.



WORK IN CANADA

Canadian work experience will provide points across several factors and increase one's CRS score.



STUDY ENGLISH

Increase Canadian language scores to maximum language proficiency points



TAKE ANOTHER COURSE

Additional education can increase CRS scores



SPOUSE

Compare which spouse has higher score based on preliminary assessment. Or consider not including spouse if bringing score down.

Study in Canada to improve CRS score

Questions to ask before applying for a program or study permit

Why?

Will it be useful to applicant?

Logical?

Does program make sense for applicant's profile?

Temporary?

Demonstrable ties to home country proven?

Useful?

Will credential meaningfully increase CRS points?

- ✓ Many universities and colleges qualify as **Designated Learning Institutions**
- ✓ Afford graduates opportunity to **work after graduation**, further providing avenue to improve CRS
- ✓ **Canadian education** credential will provide **additional CRS points**

Work in Canada to improve CRS score

Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA)-based

Prospective employer seeks permission to hire on grounds that no suitable Cdn or PR for the job

Intra-company transfers

Transfer from foreign co. to parent, subsid. or affiliate; if applicant a business owner, can create Cdn. operation to facilitate transfer

Provincial Nomination Programs

Usu require significant investment or job offer from provincial co. and demonstrated intention to settle in specific province

Significant Benefits work permit

If applicant has unique business idea that creates “significant benefit” to Canada if applicant permitted to work

Post-Graduate Work Permit

Graduation from qualifying DLI's can lead to up to 3 year post-graduation work permit

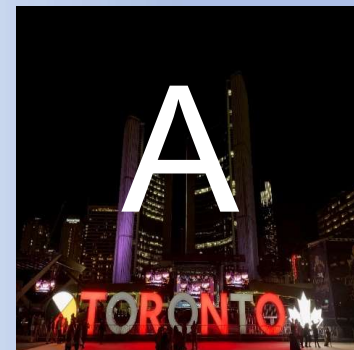
